

Rajanpur Flood Emergency Need Assessment Report

Lodhran Pilot Project-LPP

Overview of the need assessment

The following information was gathered in a community-based needs assessment conducted in the District Rajanpur, tehsils Jampur, Rajanpur, and Rujhaan. Assessment intended to collect all the secondary and primary information associated with the highly affected areas clubbed with details of damages due to floods and heavy rain. In accordance with the intended objectives, LPP proceeded to assess the areas and used **Assessment Tool** to gather the information. Details of the assessment are as under.

Methods used to gather information

Team LPP adopted the following methods to hold the assessment.

- In-person interviews
- Field visits
- Meetings with government officials
- Secondary data as per SITREP released on daily basis by the district government

Coordination meetings

The district government has nominated Ms. Tehmina Dilshaad, Deputy Director Social Welfare as a focal person, LPP assessment teams had a series of coordination and planning meetings to devise a strategy to kick start emergency response. DD social welfare accompanied LPP team and visited relief camps established by the district government and key areas of Tehsil Rajanpur and Rujhaan to list down damages.



Vulnerability details of the areas visited: Interviews were conducted with the 11 individuals consisting of flood-affected populations and government officials-Deputy Director Social Welfare, Ms. Tehmina. As per plan, LPP team assessed all three tehsils during the day and selected revenue villages as per District emergency control room data. LPP team visited and assessed the following areas.

Safdarabad, Rujhaan-12 villages, 155 HH damaged- 9204 total population affected

Chak Patiat, Rajanpur- 46 villages, HH damaged 554- (75% partially)-12240 total population affected

Hajipur, Jampur- 40 villages, 126 HH damaged- 10439 total population affected

Key Findings and updated information

Almost all groups of ages are facing myriad obstacles in regard to reaching out for help. Affected populations are still evacuating their household belongings on self-help basis but they don't agree to move to relief camps established by the district government. Relief camp is only the place for those who don't own any land. Including all target groups, women and persons with disabilities are also underserved population. People have been asking for ration packs rather than cooked food. They didn't directly ask for money but their livelihoods seem to be destroyed due to these recent heavy rains and flash floods. As per district government data, 118 revenue villages covering 368090 acres of land have been destroyed. Few details of the district is as below in **Table-1.1**

Few of the stakeholders were found holding need assessments in the target areas. As per the social welfare office record, Helping Hand and Penny Appeal is in close coordination with the district government but no significant emergency response has been initiated by the international donor community yet.
